

This was a period of renewed democracy in Montreal after 25 years of Drapeau-style politics. Under mayors Jean Doré (1986-1994) and Pierre Bourque (1994-2001), Montreal built more than 150kms of paths, created parks and planted trees, and launched the Eco-Quartier and Eco-centre recycling programs. Provincially, this was also the Parti Québécois-era of municipal reorganization and the call for "Une île, une ville." By January 1, 2002, all the municipalities on the island of Montreal were merged into the megacity of Montreal; Meadowbrook was now under the jurisdiction of an amalgamation of Côte Saint-Luc-Montreal West-Hampstead and Lachine. Intense backlash to the amalgamation, however, ultimately forced a municipal election that ousted Bourque and brought in Gérald Tremblay as mayor in November 2001.

Please Read This Notice

At the last council meeting of Ville St. Pierre, it has been learned that a change in zoning bylaws on the 70 acre portion of **MEADOWBROOK GOLF COURSE** (south of Cote St. Luc Rd.) belonging to Ville St. Pierre was proposed.

On August 15th there will be a **PUBLIC HEARING** at the Town Hall of Ville St. Pierre (7:00 PM) where the zoning changes will be tabled and approved as follows:

- Zone 24 -south of the St. Pierre River (approximately in line with Banstead Park) will be zoned for single family dwellings, parks, and playgrounds.
- Zone 26 north of the St. Pierre River- will be zoned for single to multi family
 dwellings, high rises, combined residential and commercial, and commercial establishments.

One must realize that this area may encompass up to 2,000 residential units, which is four to five times the population density of Montreal West!

Furthermore, a formal request from Ville St. Pierre to the Town of Montréal West will be made to provide three-accese-roads into this area.

The proposal is to construct access routes from SHERATON DRIVE via a RADCLIFFE ROAD thoroughfare, an opening across from BANSTEAD PARK, and the widening of COTE ST. LUC ROAD.

Although the residents of Montreal West have no say whatsoever in the voting or legislative procedures of Ville St. Pierre we must actively show our concern and be totally aware as to the developmental intentions of Montreal West, and of our neighboring municipalities if we wish to preserve the precious dwindling green spaces, and the serenity of our town.

Marathon Realties, real-estate arm of Canadian Pacific Railways, owners of the Meadowbrook property, looks to build 280 houses on the Côte Saint-Luc portion of Meadowbrook Golf Club.

On the Ville Saint-Pierre portion (now in the borough of Lachine), Marathon pushes for a zoning change to allow construction of 2,000+ housing units, single-family dwellings south of the St. Pierre River and multifamily, high-rise towers (to a maximum of 25 stories) north of the river, along with commercial buildings. Three access roads are planned through Montreal West.

June - GOLF (Guard our Local Face), precursor of Les Amis, forms in response to the housing project.

July - GOLF sends a letter to Mayor Roy Locke and storms the Montreal West Council meeting.

"In today's aching and overdeveloped world, the only 'higher' use for Meadowbrook is to keep it just as it is, with its meadows, its little brook-and that big old maple tree Vince Capozzi loves so much." Jack Todd, The Montreal Gazette Aug. 11, 1989.

August - Ville Saint-Pierre approves a zoning bylaw supporting high-density residential development on its section of Meadowbrook.

"I'm going to fight until the last recourse is exhausted." Howard Barza, GOLF.

"On Thursday, August 24, 1989, a large group of concerned residents of Côte Saint-Luc and Montreal West formed a circle in the cul-de-sac at the western end of Guelph Road. Each brought their chair for the meeting. Remember the aluminum and Saran Wrap chairs?"-Kay Wolofsky

September - GOLF storms the Côte Saint-Luc Council meeting announcing a 5,500-name petition to save Meadowbrook. "Don't direct your cannon fire at poor municipalities; you have to direct it at government." Eric Helfield, Councillor, Côte Saint-Luc.

GOLF goes before the Montreal Urban Committee (MUC) planning committee; Meadowbrook in the balance in the MUC green-space policy.

November - Meadowbrook an election issue in Montreal West; Dr. John Simms elected mayor, replacing Roy Locke, with councillors Howard Barza of GOLF, Bob Keaton of Alliance Quebec and MNA Gordon Atkison.

January - GOLF meets with Marathon.

Meadowbrook at the heart of the debate at public consultations on Côte Saint-Luc master development plan. Revised plan calls for building of 318 houses on Meadowbrook. GOLF holds information kiosk at Cavendish Mall

February - Station 15 police called to Côte Saint-Luc Council meeting to assist security. TV cameras rolling; pushing and shoving; heckling and hissing.

Resolution by Côte Saint-Luc to keep Meadowbrook green; supported by Montreal West resolution.

April - Resolution passed by Côte Saint-Luc City Council to have MUC place a reserve on Meadowbrook.

Mayor Bernard Lang sues Kay Wolofsky and Barbara Schneiderman of GOLF for \$95,000 for libel, following publication of advertisement in The Suburban. They countersue for damages of \$25,000 each.

June - MUC public meeting: conservation plans for Meadowbrook and Angell Woods in Beaconsfield under consideration; MUC excludes Meadowbrook.

GOLF and Green Coalition launch Adopt-a-Tree campaign. August - Public meeting at Montreal West Town Hall.

September - Montreal Parks and Playgrounds Association proposes creation of a regional park on Meadowbrook.

MUC elects not to buy the golf course and approves Ville Saint-Pierre's urban development plan which includes widening of Côte Saint-Luc Road and extension to Highway 2-20.

Dida Berku, Barbara Schneiderman and Kay Wolofsky of GOLF run in Côte Saint-Luc elections under Citizens Coalition banner.

December - MUC sends Ville Saint-Pierre back to drawing board, asking for studies on access and security.

Côte Saint-Luc and Montreal West charter bus for citizens to MUC meeting at Montreal City Hall.

Mayor Lang votes in favour of Ville Saint-Pierre plan at MUC! Côte Saint-Luc Resolution 901,225 to preserve Meadowbrook as green space adopted.


GOLF holds Information session in Côte Saint-Luc with 130 in attendance.

December - Ville Saint-Pierre's zoning change overturned by MUC planning commission, saying VSP must come to an agreement with Côte Saint-Luc and Montreal West on access.

June - Fire at Consumers Glass in Ville Saint-Pierre demonstrates access problems in the area.

Côte Saint-Luc zoning bylaw increases lot size on their side of Meadowbrook from 5,400 sq. ft. to 6,000 sq. ft., thus limiting number of housing units.

December - Les Amis de Meadowbrook 800-name petition presented to Claude Ryan, Minister of Public Security and Municipal Affairs


June - Motion by Montreal West requesting "substantive public security, environmental and traffic studies" before any residential project is examined on Meadowbrook.

Marathon holds meetings with Côte Saint-Luc, Ville Saint-Pierre and Les Amis at Meadowbrook Club House to present plans for Wentworth Project. Public meetings also held.

Wentworth Project proposes 880 units in Côte Saint-Luc (318 allowed by city) and 1,485 in Ville Saint-Pierre (down from 2,700) for a total of 2,365 instead of the previous 4,500. A train stop is planned.





March - Marathon submits plans for 25 homes near Guelph in Côte Saint-Luc.

April - Montreal West Council approves resolution by Public Security Commissioner Howard Barza to ask Montreal Urban Community, provincial and federal governments for public safety studies.

Les Amis ask for public consultations on Meadowbrook in Côte Saint-Luc.

May - Crowded council meeting in Côte Saint-Luc to adopt site plan proposed by Councillor Dida Berku to regulate 30-m buffer zones, protect trees and regulate excavation and disposal of contaminated soil along with placement of parks. Two hundred citizens attend, five police officers present. Motion passed.

Major debates at Côte Saint-Luc council. Mayor Lang approves Project.

Marathon notifies Côte Saint-Luc if they can build only 318 units, there will be an underpass between Côte Saint-Luc and Saint-Pierre; if they are allowed to build 880 units, there will be no underpass and more green space (30% instead of none) and a community centre. Last option: buy them out for \$30 million.

Second meeting with Marathon.

Another group is created: The Golfers of Meadowbrook. Spokesperson: Jane Nelson.

Côte Saint-Luc rejects Marathon proposal

August - Marathon unveils plans for 280 single-family homes in Côte Saint-Luc.

"I urge one and all to remain steadfast in this vigil. It is clear that if victory is to be won it will be because of the leadership of the citizens and not because of the leadership of the elected." Marvin, city Councillor, Montreal.

September - Meeting at Meadowbrook Club House: Les Amis considering the creation of a public land trust to buy and golf course, a proposal by architect Michael Fish.

December - Legal defence committee of Barbara Schneiderman Kay Wolofsky against Mayor Bernard Lang organizes fundraising event at Montreal West Town Hall.

"It will not stay a golf course . . . It's uneconomical for us to run.. as a golf course." John Sullivan, assistant VP, Sales and Marketing, Marathon

"We want it, we love it, but we simply can't afford it" Councillor Allan Levine. Côte Saint-Luc

"Meadowbrook is a great natural resource that should be held... and future generations would bless us if we did." - John Simms, Mayor, Montreal West

June - Public consultations on Côte Saint-Luc site plan. 150 present. Vote deferred three times. Ad hoc committee formed to negotiate with Marathon.

September - Ad hoc committee proposal on site plan presented to public.

"Foxes dart about and birds serenade the golfers, mallard ducks and blue jays have been seen in the vicinity of the course's 140 acres." Mark Lidbetter, The Suburban Tree protection bylaw proposed by Councillor Dida Berku passed in Côte Saint-Luc.


"You don't need to legislate every bloody tree in Côte Saint-Luc." Councillor Ruth Kovac, Côte Saint-Luc "People from Montreal West come here and constantly

November - Municipal elections. Councillor Dida Berku running for mayor.

Register open to Côte Saint-Luc residents to oppose site-plan bylaw arrived at following negotiations with Marathon and to trigger referendum. Plan calls for 5400-sq. ft. lot size, easing of tree protection bylaw. Marathon to pay for parks and traffic lights. No underpass, no widening of Côte Saint-Luc Road. 190 signatures. Bylaw rejected. Referendum slated for April 2, 1995.

January – Ramping up for referendum on 3rd Côte Saint-Luc site-plan bylaw.

Marathon to pay for referendum.

March - Info session at Rudolf Steiner School ahead of Côte Saint-Luc referendum.

April - Referendum in Côte Saint-Luc on site plan bylaws and lot size for Meadowbrook. Letters from Côte Saint-Luc, Marathon and Les Amis to Côte Saint-Luc residents. All three bylaws are rejected.

May - Marathon unveils new plans and presents new partner, Pacific International Equities headed by Charles Bedzow.

October - Grand opening of Meadowbrook housing project. Les Amis organizes Sunday Rallies in the Park, handing potential buyers along Côte Saint-Luc Road The Truth about Meadowbrook leaflets

November - Côte Saint-Luc City Council approves development plan for Meadowbrook which calls for the construction of 243 homes and a strip mall in Côte Saint-Luc.

June - Promoter Groupe Pacific closes Meadowbrook sales office

Merger of towns of Lachine and Saint-Pierre.

2000 0

June - Rezoning by-law in Côte Saint-Luc endangered when CP submits petition opposing bylaw and forcing a referendum; bylaw passed.

July - Côte Saint-Luc withdraws rezoning bylaw to correct errors and resubmits in August.

October - Côte Saint-Luc rezones its half of Meadowbrook as "golf course and complimentary uses" reflecting its actual use.

September - Draft zoning bylaw consultations announced for October in Côte Saint-Luc.

November - Meadowbrook closed to public for winter activities.

May - Canadian Pacific Properties seeking reversal of Côte Saint-Luc rezoning bylaw through the courts; asking for \$20 million compensation.
